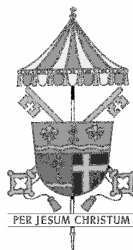


### TENEBRAE IN CONCERT...

### **SPECIAL COLLECTION FOR THE FORMATION OF PERMANENT DEACONS...**

Since 1977, 385 men have been ordained as permanent deacons in the Archdiocese. There currently are 201 active deacons ordained for the Archdiocese, and about 90 percent of them are married. There also are 65 retired deacons. Deacons serve in parishes, hospitals, archdiocesan agencies, and other organizations. Many continue to work full-time jobs, requiring them to balance family lives and professions with their ministry as a deacon. During formation and after ordination, deacons offer their time, personal gifts and material goods to build up the Church in the Archdiocese. Their service extends into many areas of parish life, as they assist all of us in carrying out the mission of the Church. 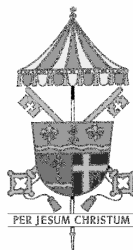
**The Society of St Vincent de Paul is composed of people who seek their personal holiness by works of charity.**

### **WHY A REGISTERED PARISHIONER...**

Due to the number of requests for baptisms, the Cathedral Parish adopted a policy some years ago that generally requires the parents to be registered parishioners in the Cathedral parish before their infant may be baptized here. For the same reason, normal policy practice requires the bride or groom in an impending wedding to be a registered parishioner and practicing Catholic for a minimum of one year for preferred dates and for a more modest stipend. Non-parishioners must be registered in a Catholic parish somewhere and will need to secure their pastor's permission to be baptized or married outside of their proper parish before we can schedule any ceremony for them. If you attend Mass at the Cathedral Basilica regularly, please consider becoming a registered parishioner. Forms may be obtained by calling the rectory office at 314-373-8200.

### **HEARING HIS CALL...**

Every baptized person has a call directly from the Lord to His service. Our discipleship is a vocation to holiness and service of the Lord. Some of the baptized receive another call within that call to the specific vocation of ordained priesthood or vowed religious life. Their response to that vocational invitation requires generosity and a life long commitment. More than in the immediate past, many young people are stepping forward to respond positively to the invitation; many more are needed. For all of them, the support of family, friends, and fellow Catholics ought to be expected, though it is not always present. Each Catholic must make prayer in support of young people's vocational response an integral and necessary component of their daily regimen of prayer; it is not an "extra", but rather a major part of everyone's discipleship.

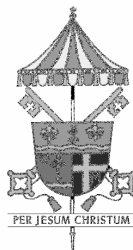
